Looking Toward the Lake Oswego of Tomorrow

Appreciation for the past, compassion for the present, and responsibility for the future are Tibetan principles that also happen to work pretty well right here in Lake Oswego. Each of these three simple principles seemed to guide the discussions and decisions made when setting new Council Goals for 2005.

Each January, City Councilors hold a two-day Goal Setting Retreat to reflect upon the accomplishments of the previous year, evaluate progress on continuing projects, and determine new priorities for the year ahead.

Input from community groups and City boards and commissions prior to the retreat helps the Councilors set goals to better meet the needs and expectations of our community. The vision created by our elected officials is then carried out in cooperation with City staff, volunteers, and a number of partner organizations.



As you can see below, Council generated an ambitious set of proposals that address the demands of today's community while simultaneously planning for the future. Council continues to integrate ideals of sustainability to help improve the quality of life for generations to come.

Of course, a constant limitation involves fiscal resources. As the budget process for 2005-2007 gets underway, the City is committed to budgeting with existing resources and maintaining current service levels as practicable. Budget meetings will start in April with a review of the City Manager's proposed budget for the 2005-07 biennium.

Ballot Measure 37 Recap

Lake Oswego City Council held a well-attended public forum in February to gather feedback about Ballot Measure 37. Following passage of the measure in November, local government has been tasked with implementing local ordinances.

When Opportunity Knocks Too Often

What do magazine subscriptions, candy bars, and furniture have in common? They are but a few of many items that solicitors sell door-to-door.

Door-to-door solicitation is legal in Lake Oswego to those with a valid City permit and business license, and they must carry copies with them. Solicitation is only allowed between the hours of 9 a.m. and 9 p.m., Daylight Savings Time, and 9 a.m. and 8 p.m., Standard Time. Entering property outside of these hours is a civil infraction.

Solicitation is prohibited entirely if the property owner has posted a "No Solicitation" sign on the premises. Persons who enter onto private property posted with a "No Solicitation" sign are guilty of criminal trespass.

The rules apply regardless of whether a solicitor is selling something or not. Any person or group who goes door-to-door for any reason to property used for residential purposes may be cited (LOC Article 34.16).

"No Solicitation" signs may be purchased from the Lake Oswego Chamber of Commerce at 242 B Avenue or City Hall at 380 A Avenue. The City Code also provides specifications for those who wish to make their own sign.

Halt the Invasion of Invasive Plants

Invasive plants can spread rapidly, choking out native plants and natural habitat. English Ivy, European Clematis, and Morning Glory are a few of the plants that literally take over if not held at bay.

Your help is needed to: 1) stop planting non-native plants that spread; 2) remove invasive plants from your property; and 3) join in the many community service projects scheduled throughout the year.

Making Water Quality a Priority in Lake Oswego

Last month, we introduced the topic of surface water runoff and the affects our decisions and actions have on aquatic resources. All street drains lead to streams, creeks, rivers, ponds or lakes.

This month, we focus on regulations that help protect water quality. Maintaining standards and enforcing violations helps prevent pollution.

Surface Water System (LOC 38.26.930): It is illegal to discharge soil, debris or harmful/hazardous substances into the surface water management system.

Erosion Control (LOC 52.02): Permits are required for activities disturbing 500 square feet or more or within 50 feet of natural waterways.

Drainage for Minor Development (LOC 50.40): This protects adjacent properties from adverse alteration of existing drainage systems (including streams and surface runoff).

Drainage for Major Development (LOC 50.41): Creating 6,060 square feet or more of impervious area requires surface water management measures.

We're at your "Listserv-ice"

There's a new way to stay in touch with what's happening at City Hall. Best of all, it's easy, speedy and free.

By subscribing to the new "listservs" on the City website, you'll receive information about the topics you select as soon as it becomes available. Once you have subscribed to one or all of the lists, you'll receive emails that include applicable updates, announcements, and links to new documents.

Options currently available include: Annual Report, City Council Information, Emergency Information, Friday Letter, Hello LO, News Releases, Parks Catalog, Planning Notices, and Street Maintenance. Additional categories may be added in the future.

Some distribution lists will be contacted on a regular basis, and others will only be sent as necessary. Your privacy will be protected, and email addresses will only be used for the subscriptions you select. Subscriptions can be canceled at any time, and you will stop receiving the messages immediately.

According to a recent survey, 86% of Oswegans have home Internet access. Still more have access to email. This new information tool makes the most of available technology, while saving time and valuable resources in the process.

Sensitive Lands Regulations (LOC 5.16):

Development restrictions apply to properties with stream corridors or wetlands, or that have environmentally significant tree groves.

Greenway Management Overlay District (LOC 50.15): This restricts development in areas adjacent to the Willamette River.

Parks and Open Space (LOC Article 50.46) Major development must set aside at least 20%, and commercial/industrial must set aside at least 15%, of the gross land area as open space or park land.

Council is considering new regulations that include restricting the use of phosphorous fertilizers and enhancing penalties for repeat polluters. A recently approved Surface Water Bond issue will provide funding for restoration and enhancement projects.
