Lakeview Boulevard Improvements

You can look forward to a new and improved Lakeview Boulevard between Pilkington and Bryant by the end of November. Work has begun on improvements which include a new pathway on the north side, a new storm drain system to collect and channel street runoff, a new roadway surface, a raised crosswalk, and new landscaping.

This project will also include installation of the City's first speed cushions. These are speed bumps with channels allowing emergency vehicles to pass without having to slow down so response times won't be reduced. A raised crosswalk between Tualatin Street and Ashley Court will help increase safety for children who must cross Lakeview Boulevard on their way to school.

Candidates nominated for selection should not have been paid or otherwise recognized for their efforts. Elected and appointed officials are ineligible, as are City employees.

Transportation Management Plan for Downtown Neighborhoods

One of the benefits that neighbors who live near downtown Lake Oswego treasure is walking and biking to nearby shops and activities. The Transportation Management Plan (TMP) for Downtown Neighborhoods is a project about smart planning for mobility around the downtown area.

This year-long project is aimed at promoting opportunities for safely getting to more places and will result in the identification of projects that can be undertaken over time. Information was collected this summer about the walking, biking and driving dynamics at work on our public streets. On October 19, neighbors are invited to participate in a public forum to identify solutions.

At a public forum in May, neighbors came out to share their ideas and concerns. These will form the outline for the continued discussion on October 19, in City Hall Council Chambers at 6:30 p.m., including:

Pedestrian Safety - Public streets are used by people in cars and on bikes, kids, and the elderly. Safety for all users is of the utmost importance. Pedestrian corridors of particular concern include: Evergreen, C Avenue, Andrews, Fourth Street north of E Avenue, Tenth Street, Lake Bay Court and sections of Berwick Road.

Cut-through Traffic and Stop Signs - Neighbors from around downtown shared concerns about cut-through traffic using neighborhood streets. In addition, neighbors shared an interest in implementing a more regular pattern of stop signs in the First Addition neighborhood.

Parking - Volunteers from the Evergreen and First Addition neighborhoods counted cars parked on public streets and in lots downtown. Information was collected during the week at lunch hour, in the late afternoon/evening and on weekends and during downtown events.

Canal Bridge Replacement Project Underway

Planning activities for replacement of the Canal Bridge have now taken a back seat to heavy equipment and workers in hard hats. The long awaited bridge replacement project got underway the day after Labor Day. The City's bridge contractor closed South Shore Blvd. between Kelok Rd. and Allen Rd. on September 6. The closure will remain in effect until December 31, when the bridge will reopen to motorists and pedestrians.

As shown in the photo, the deck of the old bridge is partially demolished and occupied by several large pieces of equipment making this a particularly dangerous area. As a result, boaters wishing to cross under the bridge to access the lake also face restrictions.

Advance notification of the closure alerted the community to detours, and it appears that motorists, runners, walkers, and cyclists have adapted to the alternate routes. 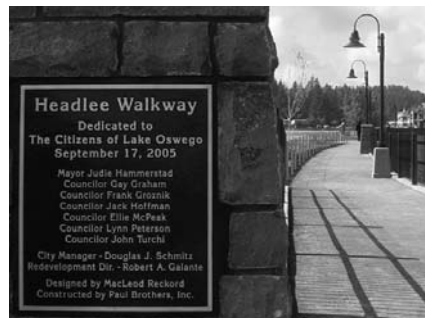


Construction has begun on the new Oswego Canal Bridge, which will remain closed through December.

Headlee Walkway Complete

The grand opening of the Headlee Walkway took place on Saturday, September 17. After the ribbon cutting by Mayor Judie Hammerstad, 200 attendees participated in a drum and bagpipe-led procession along the walkway.

The Mayor, past Lake Corporation President Dave Schulz, and Nancy and Susan Headlee addressed the crowd and gave their thanks for the new lakeside pathway. The Headlee Walkway runs from lower Millennium Plaza Park to the South end of Third Street, along Lakewood Bay.



Schools Get Fire Sprinklers

When school opened in September, all of the schools in the Lake Oswego School District had fire-extinguishing sprinkler systems for the first time in history. The safety enhancements were thanks to an agreement between the City and the School District made in October 2001.

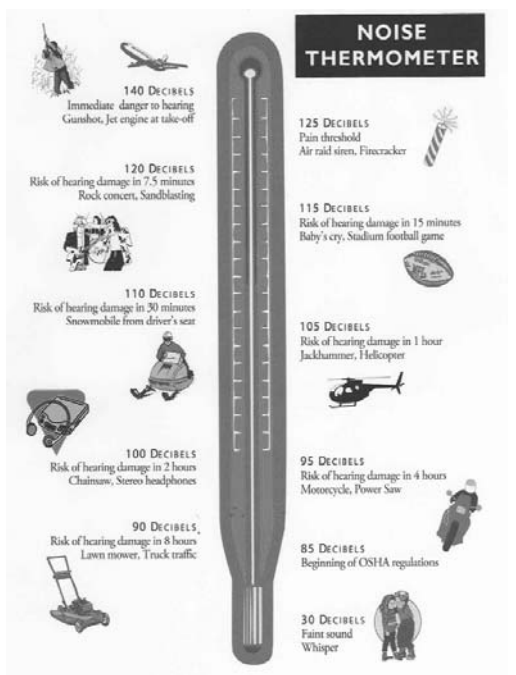
The City's water reservoir system is designed to include capacity for domestic use, fire suppression and storage for extended emergency needs. Of these three needs, reservoir capacity for fire suppression at public schools is by far the largest component, and the City was facing the need for an additional four million gallon reservoir. With the passage of the School District's Facilities Bond, the City saw an opportunity to work with the District to ensure that all new facilities were equipped with fire sprinklers and to retrofit older facilities.

The City agreed to pay the District up to \$1,502,000 to retrofit elementary and junior high schools that did not have sprinklers. The District agreed to install sprinklers as part of the construction in other facilities, resulting in fire-extinguishing sprinkler systems in every school within the district. Besides improved safety for students in the schools, this project benefits the community by conserving resources that would have otherwise been expended on the construction of a new reservoir.

Construction Noise in Neighborhoods

Residents recently approached the City Council and requested relief from construction noise to preserve the livability of their neighborhoods. Residents complained of construction noise from early in the morning to late at night. Councilors passed an ordinance at the August 2 meeting to address those concerns. On September 6, the Council expanded the previous action to include a prohibition against amplified sound associated with construction activity in response to complaints of loud music occurring at work sites.

The "Noise Thermometer" (at right) was provided by the Sight & Hearing Association to depict decibel levels associated with a variety of noises and potential hearing damage. The City requests those doing construction work to be good neighbors and be aware of noise levels that may be disrupting the neighborhood. Back to School Safety

It's that time of year again, a fall nip is in the air, school is back in session, and we are busy with back to school activities. An important aspect of your child's safe arrival to school is using pedestrian crosswalks wisely. Following the tips listed below will assist both drivers and pedestrians alike in making crosswalks as safe as possible, reduce collisions and make our roads safer.

STUDENTS

- Look all ways before crossing. Watch for turning cars.
- Cross in the crosswalk. Drivers should be watching for you there.
- Stand back one step from the curb while waiting to cross the street.
- Walk, don't run, across the street.
- Never step into the street between parked cars.
- Make sure traffic is slowing down or stopped before you start to cross the street.
- Continue to watch traffic as you cross.
- Use pedestrian crossing lights. Press the button for the "walk" signal.
- Do not enter a crosswalk when the hand signal is flashing or solid orange.
- When weather is bad allow extra time for cars to stop.
- Allow plenty of time to get to school. However, it is better to be late than unsafe.

MOTORISTS

- Slow down and use extra caution when approaching a crosswalk
- Watch for flashing lights
- Be prepared to stop when pedestrians are approaching crosswalk
- Do not pass another vehicle as you approach a crosswalk.

Community Disaster Readiness

The City of Lake Oswego continues to work to better prepare for the types of disasters that could affect this region. The following is a list of some of the programs the City has been involved with:

- At the heart of any effective disaster plan is a group of well-organized volunteers. The City of Lake Oswego has had a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program since 1995. Lake Oswego was the second community in Oregon to form a citizen response team and has trained over 500 members. The CERT program trains citizens to be first responders in the event of serious community-wide disasters. Training includes fighting small fires, search and rescue of victims, and learning disaster medicine and psychology. Watch for future articles on individual and neighborhood preparedness as well as opportunities for CERT training.
 - Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) program. The Lake Oswego ARES is made up from volunteers that have their amateur radio license. During an emergency, members will staff the fire stations and work with the CERT teams to give the City of Lake Oswego a backup or supplemental communication system between the community and the City Emergency Operation Center (EOC).
 - In 2004, the City produced a FEMA approved Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan which can be viewed on the Fire Department page of the City's website.
 - The City is a member of the Regional Emergency Management Group (REMG) to ensure plans are coordinated.
 - Lake Oswego is part of the Urban Area Security Initiative grant program, which provides funding to enhance preparedness.
 - The City has an Emergency Operation Plan for major emergencies.
 - EOC staff holds regular drills and has run well during smaller activations such as ice storms and floods.

Lake Oswego Responds Employees Help with Hurricane Relief Efforts

Wayne Pieschel, a 17-year veteran of the Fire Department, and Michael Nicholson, a 13-year veteran, were deployed to assist in the aftermath of the catastrophic natural disaster caused by Hurricane Katrina. The two completed a class and orientation in Atlanta, GA alongside 800 firefighters from across the country.

Pieschel and Nicholson were paired together with four firefighters from Gresham and two firefighters from California. Their assignment will take them to Biloxi, Mississippi, to assess damage, provide basic first aid and inform victims about the initial steps to receive federal aid. They are going to the heart of the destruction and are expected to be self-sufficient for six days, and are expected to be deployed for at least 30 days before returning home.

In addition, Citizen Information Coordinator Josh Thomas volunteered for a temporary, two-week placement with the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Thomas worked with public information staff at the Astrodome in Houston, Texas, where many Katrina evacuees were sheltered.

Lake Oswego joins several agencies from across the nation in this assignment. Workers assigned to this deployment will be reimbursed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency for expenses.

Fire Department Accepting Donations

The Lake Oswego Fire Department is helping Northwest Medical Teams with the Hurricane Katrina relief effort by being a drop-off site for donated supplies. Northwest Medical Teams is asking citizens to donate basic **personal hygiene** items such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, deodorant, soap, etc. and primary **school supplies** like pencils, pens, notebooks, calculators, binders, colored pencils, etc. The drop-off site is in the lobby of the Main Fire Station located at 300 B Avenue. Supplies will be accepted through November 1.

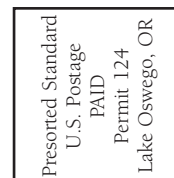
