At the December 19 City Council meeting, several local heroes were recognized for their contributions to the community and for helping neighbors through acts of kindness, without pay or recognition. The Council created the Unsung Hero Award in 2001 to identify and recognize those people who make a difference in our community.

The 2006 recipients are:

MIKE BUCK

Mike has sponsored the Clackamas County League of Women Voters' Garden Tour fundraiser for the last four years. He has been an alternate representative on the Lake Grove Village Center Plan, attending 116 meetings and logging over 500 hours and still counting. Mike has also been the Flower Basket Chair and hoists the baskets into place for all to enjoy. In addition, he has also served on the Lake Grove Neighborhood Association Board, boosting attendance at the Last of Summer Fun Fest from 500 to 4000.

BOB EICK AND ESTHER WOOD

Over the past eight years, Bob and Esther have faithfully staffed the Computer Lab every Wednesday at the Adult Community Center. They answer questions, give instruction, and solve computer problems for anyone seeking assistance. Together, these two have helped our seniors enjoy using computers.

RON HANSON

For the last 4 years, Ron has chaired the Uplands Neighborhood Association, bringing new dedication and direction to the organization. He once knocked on all 400 doors to invite neighbors to get involved. He helped form the Friends of Springbrook Park and, with the help of 90 neighbors in July 2005, a once overgrown lot was transformed into Prestwick Park. Ron has engaged the neighborhood in a new level of civic involvement. As one new resident stated at the first annual picnic, "I have never felt so welcomed. This feels like home."

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Councilors Share Advice With Successors

On January 2, after a combined 20 years of service on Lake Oswego City Council, Gay Graham, Jack Hoffman and Lynn Peterson will pass the torch to three new Councilors--Roger Hennagin, Kristin Johnson, and Donna Jordan--who were elected in November to take their place.

A New Address for Clean Streams

The City is updating its Surface Water Master Plan to set the direction for surface water management over the next two decades. The effort has been named the "Clean Streams Plan."

Are You In a Flood Hazard Area?

A new floodplain study and accompanying maps have been completed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), showing what parts of Lake Oswego and surrounding areas would likely be affected by significant flooding.

See what has been updated and how it might affect you at an open house on January 18, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Meet in the auditorium on the first floor of Clackamas County's Sunnybrook Service Center, 9101 SE Sunnybrook Blvd., in Clackamas. FEMA representatives will have newly proposed updated flood insurance maps for review and will provide information about the National Flood Insurance Program.

Lake Interceptor Information and Updates

In December, the project team briefed the City Council on the comparison of in-lake and out-of-lake options for solving capacity and structural integrity issues.

The range of options under consideration broadened in 2005 to include other options that would address short-term (capacity relief only) and long-term (structural integrity as well as capacity) needs as well.

At the December meeting, Council directed staff to focus on long term capacity and structural options as the work moves forward. The Oswego Lake Interceptor System draft report comparing the various options is due to the Council in early 2007.

A public meeting on the options will be held in spring 2007. Meeting time and location will be published in a future *Hello L.O.* Briefings with interested and potentially impacted parties are also planned for early 2007. Public input will be considered in developing a final report and action plan. That report is expected to be approved by City Council in the spring or summer of 2007.

JACK HOFFMAN

"There are always two sides to every story. What you hear in the grocery store has some truth to it, as does what you hear in the Council Chambers or what you read in the newspaper. Before taking a position on something, make sure you've heard from enough perspectives.

The big issues are in the budget. Pay close attention to the Lake Interceptor, infill and its effect on neighborhoods, and the Lake Grove Village Center Plan. Councilors will discuss, debate, and challenge one another on regular occasion, but it is important to try to reach consensus."

LYNN PETERSON

"Be patient. It took two years to build coalitions and to come up with solid approaches on just a few issues to get them in the system.

Be knowledgeable. Tours of sites really help to understand the issues. Try to take the emotion out of statements and discussions when possible. Remember that you can't legislate for individuals; you have to do what's best for the community as a whole."

At their last Council meeting, Mayor Judie Hammerstad said, "You have been valuable members of this Council and your presence and contributions will be missed."

Answer the Call for Emergency Notification



By taking a moment to register with the City's CodeRed system, you can ensure that you will be notified if there is an emergency or urgent warning that affects your home or business.

Like reverse 9-1-1, we call you in the case of an emergency. The automated service can be used in case of fires, chemical spills, evacuations, lock downs, downed power lines, lost individuals, abductions, water system problems, bomb threats, natural disasters or other emergencies.

Those who do not register their address and phone number may not be notified with CodeRed in the case of an emergency. Registration is confidential, free and easy. John began delivering Meals-on-Wheels in 1996. For 10 years, he was the weekly contact with a friendly smile and greeting to housebound elders and younger disabled adults. John cares about people and understands the importance of letting people know someone cares about them. Although John has now retired, recipients expressed their gratitude for his years of caring service.

AUDREY MATTISON

Audrey is a Lake Oswego native and active community member who is constantly looking for opportunities to improve Springbrook Park. Every Monday during the school year, Audrey leads a group of Uplands Elementary School children volunteers, into the park to pull ivy and maintain trails. She has dedicated countless hours doing publicity for volunteering, school stewardship, and restoration events, encouraging neighbors to participate.

JOHN SAMUELSON

In 1991, when John applied for a volunteer position delivering Meals-on-Wheels, he simply said he wanted to do something "helping people." Fifteen years later, John is still helping the housebound in our community receive hot, nutritious meals. To the older adults and younger disabled, he is a welcome weekly visitor; not only for the meals he brings, but also the conversation and kind words he has for each of them.

This new group brings the total number of Unsung Heroes to 17. Mayor Hammerstad and Councilor Graham thanked the volunteer judges for their review and deliberations, and thanked the honorees on behalf of the community for making the Lake Oswego community a better place to live, work, and play.
