Community Center Open House



Managing Sewer Overflows in the Short Run

The Oswego Lake Interceptor System (OLIS) includes over 13,000 feet of pipe traversing Oswego Lake and over 5,000 feet of smaller trunk sewers constructed through canals and bays. The pipeline has been determined to be too small to meet capacity demands during periods of heavy rainfall and is structurally unsound in the event of an earthquake. During periods of high rainfall, system capacity has been exceeded and flows have surged out of some manholes around the lake. These overflows are unacceptable to the City and are the main reason the City Council made the OLIS project a top priority for 2007.

The City and Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) recently agreed to enter into a Mutual Agreement and Order (MAO) that establishes a timetable for solving OLIS capacity issues. The MAO also outlines how the City will deal with overflows until an improved interceptor is in place. The City's interim plan for abating

overflows until the upgraded OLIS comes on line in 2012 includes:

- Capturing a portion of future overflows on-site with special equipment.
- Rehabilitating upstream segments of the sewer system that allow infiltration of groundwater during high rainfall periods.
- Implementing a sustained program of flow monitoring and modeling to support the City's wastewater collection system rehabilitation efforts.

The goal of these actions is to reduce overflow frequency and volume to better protect water quality and public health. The City Council will make a final decision on the interceptor final design in August 2007.


This is a challenging, eighteen hole par-three course that plays 2,724 yards for a par 54. The groomed public course has a gentle roll and a creek that winds through several of the holes on the back nine. The mountain views from the driving range include Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Adams. The golf course provides a comfortable environment for all ability levels to enjoy a chal-

lenging recreational experience.

The full-service pro shop features pro-line equipment, demo programs, and a club repair and regripping service. The shop features the latest Callaway and Ping golf equipment.

The lighted, covered practice range has 18 anti-shock artificial turf mats — 13 are covered and 4 are heated. There is also a new fairway/green bunker.

Tenth Street "Green Street" Plan

What do you do with 40 inches of annual rainfall? For a five block stretch of Tenth Street, Lake Oswego will send it to a 'green street' that will slow and treat the storm water, rather than sending it to a pipe. In addition to removing pollutants from storm water, the green street will create an attractive streetscape, a green walking experience, and a welcoming neighborhood gateway. A generous 100 feet of right-of-way allows the Tenth Street Plan to include a series of rain gardens and vegetated swales that use water friendly plants to remove sediment from storm water runoff from streets and parking areas. A walkway through the vegetated area will complete a link in the City's Pathway Plan and provide a safe route for students to Forest Hills Elementary School. - A book that is affordable and available in paperback and audio tape

More Recycling Options

Plastic tubs and their lids can now be included in curbside recycling! Clean plastic tubs such as those used for yogurt, margarine, cottage cheese and salsa, and "bucket-style" tubs used for cat litter, laundry detergent and the like are acceptable. Plastic nursery pots also are okay.

Please **DO NOT** include brittle "take-out" plastics from the bakery or deli, plastic bags, "clam shells" (hinged fast food containers), Styrofoam® (blocks nor peanuts), meat trays, plastic toys, wading pools, infant bath tubs, plastic cups, plates and utensils, plastic packaging, or pill bottles without screw tops.

Remember, if in doubt, put it in the garbage. Recycling options exist for some "other" plastics; they just don't go in curbside or business recycling. For example, plastic bags can be taken back to major grocery stores. For more information, please contact your garbage and recycling hauler, Allied Waste Services, at 503-682-3900.

Sustainability at ACC

The Adult Community Center is now using new packaging for home delivered meals. Replacing the Styrofoam containers is a compressed cardboard product that is biodegradable. Delivery volunteers appreciate the new format because the packages can be stacked and they are sealed to reduce the chance of spills. In addition to being Earth friendly, this new packaging allows kitchen staff to freeze unused food for future use, thus reducing food waste.

The ACC has also purchased a new composting "worm wigwam" to recycle food scraps from the Senior Meal Program. These hardworking red worms will take 50 pounds per week of food scraps and provide enough compost to use on the landscaping of the Center's grounds. The rich finished compost byproduct reduces the need for chemical fertilizer while reducing food waste. This joint effort between staff and volunteer gardeners is another step towards the City's goal of improving sustainability.


