





Hallinan Street Questionnaire Results – May 2022

A total of 60 responses were received.



Comments - Where do people walk?

1	Obviously, if there is no sidewalk-they walk but the curb next to the yards
2	Often to the back side of Hallinan Elementary, Hallinan Woods, Freepons park, or on the circuit to Palisades.



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
3	People walk mostly along the flat areas on Hemlock.
4	All over the neighborhood. Mostly around Freepons and the school path.
5	Both sides of the road
6	Along the curbs, walking their dogs mostly.
7	Mostly south of the proposed project. The walk on the sidewalk of Hallinan Street from Hemlock to Laurel Street. Also, they walk along Hemlock Street from the cul de sac to Freepons park and farther because it is flat.
8	Not a lot of people walk this section of the street. The lower section is flat. This section is steeper, and it seems like most people would not access the school going up the hill and then back down. Most of the activity is when school begins/ends each day and for sports on the lower playing fields.
9	On the edge or in the middle of the street.
10	The majority of people are walking to and from Hallinan Grade School and Freepons Park on Hemlock. Not as often do you see people walking on Hallinan between Hemlock and Cherry Lane.
11	Through Freepons to Hallinan.
12	In the outer edge of the roadway and/or on the landscaped areas of the residential lots.
13	The main traffic for school kids is down Hemlock Street, that's also where parents park (all the way to Freepons Park) after school. It's dangerous for kids because there is no sidewalk on Hemlock. Kids on Cherry Lane take the path through the woods and walk-up Chaplin Way. The more urgent need is Hemlock Street. It really needs a sidewalk between Freepons and the school.
14	All along it
15	In the street on Hallinan Street
16	Street
17	Yes, we see people occasionally walking up and down Hallinan hill, but more foot traffic goes to the field and playground at Hallinan Elementary, and then through a footpath to connect to Cherry. It is our preferred route as well.
18	Generally, just walking in the neighborhood or going to the school bus stop
19	Thru the school field and up Chapin [scenic LOOP]. Most busy? sports events! much parking on Hallinan to access Hallinan field large SUV parking, unloading chairs, helmets strollers. New Seasons LOOP? Freepons Park, Hallinan Park, Chapin contour to groceries & shops.
20	Mostly in the neighborhood with dogs & in groups
21	Walking in the neighborhood, the school bus stop
22	Often to school or out walking dogs/exercise
23	Hallinan Elementary school
24	School - Coffee/tea shop - exercising
25	Middle of the street
26	I walk a 1 hour circuit from Laurel St thru Hallinan Woods, to a nice path from the school track to Chapin, to Cherry Lane to Hallinan St, to Hemlock, thru Freepons Park, to Bickner, to Cedar, to the "secret ancient steps" on unpaved Pearcy St leading back to Laurel. The section of Cherry Lane from the school entrance (Hawthorne) to Hallinan St is very dangerous with only the street and traffic zooming by. Recommend a sidewalk on the north, (school) side. An additional sidewalk on Hemlock to the park for the many walkers going to and from the park would be nice.
27	Along streets leading to elementary school, over toward Freepons, (and beyond toward Pallisades Market) and below toward Ash.
28	Many people enjoy walking through the neighborhood as it is. The extra wide street makes for easy walking and an enjoyable experience as it is. Also, people walk on the footpaths to the Hallinan field from Chapin, Laurel etc. In some cases, these are alternative routes with less elevation gain (instead of up Cherry Ln to Hallinan St.
29	Laurel Street, Hawthorn, Ash, Cornell, McVey
30	Hemlock Street also
31	Sometimes I choose one of the neighboring streets
32	It is safer and quieter to walk thru the Hallinan school-covered area/playground outside of school hours. Not sure why Hallinan Street would need a pathway. The street is very wide as it is. It seems like a low priority for the city.
42	The majority of people are walking to and from Hallinan Grade School and Freepons Park on Hemlock. Not as often will you see people walking on Hallinan between Hemlock and Cherry Lane.
50	Generally, just walking in the neighborhood or going to the school bus stop.

Comments - Location and Orientation Preference?

1	Mark off a pathway on one side of the street (prefer west) and NO parking is allowed on street. This also eliminates the many parent cars that clog streets and make walking even more dangerous.
2	I prefer no pathway, but if pathway, the west side
3	I am opposed to this. The street is plenty wide enough.
4	The East side would be preferable, but my answer would depend on the least amount of environmental (tree/plant removal) impact
5	The sidewalks on Hallinan are sufficient until the curve on Hallinan between Meadows and Upper Cherry Ln.
6	The corner at the top of Hallinan St is a blind corner and AWFUL for walking or biking. This project needs to take that into account for sure.
7	When our kids were students at Hallinan Elementary, it was very dangerous every day to walk around the curve of the road to walk to school. The safest option for the kids would be to have the pathway on the same side of the street as the school so that they can walk safely without needing to cross traffic to get to school.
8	Please try and keep it on one side. I don't have a preference for which location is selected.
9	There's hardly any traffic.
10	Put sidewalk on hemlock to school
11	We live on the corner of Hallinan and Hemlock and have several trees that would have to be killed and removed to make way for a sidewalk, including a stunning cherry tree and a tall tree that is either a Doug Fir or a Spruce. Looking up Hallinan from Hemlock, there are more old-growth trees on the east side of the street, along with a streetlight. There appear to be fewer old-growth trees on the west side of the street. As noted at the end of this survey, we strongly oppose this project and do not see any reason to put in a "path" or sidewalk along this section of Hallinan Street. If there "must" be a path, please install it on the west side of Hallinan Street.
12	No preference
13	The pathway should match mailboxes (on the east side of Hallinan)
14	It should connect all the way to where the sidewalk from the school ends at the crest of the hill
15	On Cherry Lane, there exists a sidewalk already at the entrance to the school. Makes sense to keep it on the same side
16	On either side, no preference
17	Makes most sense to put on the East side the elementary school path is on that side, don't want to lose trees but willing to make concessions




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18	Like Hallinan as is. Cherry Lane is in more need due to narrowness and traffic issues with cars & school busses causing roadblocks.

1	Since I am not in favor of either side of the street having a pathway--I don't see any of the applying
2	Will still walk in street. Walkers don't use the sidewalks we have!
3	I almost never walk from Hemlock up the hill to Cherry.
4	Wouldn't use it.
5	I prefer keeping things as they are. No complaints about the current situation.
6	I do not want a pathway here.
7	Very little or no need for a pathway(s) for the entire section. Might be an argument for a pathway(s) near Hemlock.
8	Many, many neighbors of all ages walk through this part of the neighborhood. It would be used by everyone, young and old.
9	Hemlock street is much higher traffic and would be used for walking, biking, running, etc. mostly for safe travel to and from school.
10	We would not use it, and again, the majority of walkers and school kids walk along Hemlock to the school or to other areas of the neighborhood, not up and down Hallinan hill. The main thoroughfare goes along Hemlock between Hallinan Elementary and Freepons Park (and further west in that direction). There are no sidewalks in these areas. People walk in the streets, and it has never been a problem. We do not see a need for a sidewalk along this portion of Hallinan Street.
11	Many dog walkers & parent-parking with kids (balls, strollers)
12	We went through this in the early 90s. Maybe marking a path next to curbs is enough as there are no sidewalks up Hallinan from Hemlock to make any connections. Please no sidewalks on Hemlock from Hallinan to Freepons
13	We prefer walking on the street since it is wide. We have done this for 32 years. We raised our family here and walked to school at Hallinan when our kids were younger. We love walking our neighborhood as it is. It is much better than much of Lake Oswego as it is. It has wonderful mature fir trees that would have to be cut down for a pathway. This would ruin the walking experience.
14	I cannot walk due to a permanent injury, but I ride/race different bicycles.
15	Don't see myself using it since the road is very wide.



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16	I would not use it, I would keep using the street as it is or go thru Hallinan
17	Wouldn't use it.

Are there current visibility concerns for drivers or pedestrians along Hallinan Street?	
Comments	
1	On Cherry Lane, Poor line of sight from Hallinan.
2	Yes, at the S end between upper Cherry and Meadows.
3	No
4	At the corner between Meadows Dr and Upper Cherry Ln., a sidewalk or path would help.
5	Where Hawthorne/Cherry/Hallinan meet on the curve it's difficult for drivers to navigate, there are no stop signs.
6	Yes
7	No, Hallinan Street is straight with good visibility.
8	Not if folks respect the speed limit.
9	Yes
10	No
11	People blowing through a four-way stop
12	Yes, especially at the curve at Hallinan and Cherry. This curve regularly freezes in the winter and because it is heavily shaded in the north, it does NOT thaw quickly. It presents a MAJOR hazard when walking and driving.
13	The top portion gets tight
14	Around the corner at the top of the hill connecting to cherry
15	None
16	No
17	Yes, no sidewalk around that corner there, and cars are not always on the lookout
18	Not really
19	Yes, the curve coming down from N Cherry as it hits Hallinan. We need speed bumps to slow traffic.
20	Yes, at the top of the hill where Hallinan meets Cherry.
21	A sidewalk wouldn't address any visibility issues
22	I don't think there currently are any concerns. This is one of the widest streets in Lake Oswego. I think it's a very safe and walkable street.
23	None
24	School bus traffic
25	Yes. Lots of school bus and school zone traffic
26	No
27	Yes, there is poor visibility at the top of Hallinan where it turns into Cherry. There would need to be a crosswalk at some point to allow people from Meadows to crossover to Cherry. There's really no room for it to be safe at the top of Hallinan though. People often speed on the downhill section of Hallinan Street too.
28	Sure, but it's hard to envision how a pathway would resolve visibility concerns. Installing a few signs seems like a less invasive, simpler, and more cost-effective solution.
29	YES, at the top of the street at the intersection of Hallinan and Cherry it is AWFUL
30	Yes, absolutely. Trying to walk around the curve in the road on the way to school is very dangerous. There is no sidewalk. Every single day on our way to school there were cars driving too fast and we often had near misses. We never allowed our kids to walk to school alone, even though we live very close to the school, because of the dangerous road conditions.
31	You do have to drive slowly at the top of Hallinan onto Cherry Lane as sometimes cars are parked along the side of the road and there is a turn there.
32	Yes, the issue is that the top of the street corner is blind.
33	The cars parked along the street currently obstruct visibility for pedestrians in the right-of-way. That's why a sidewalk or trail is needed for pedestrian safety.
34	As the street curves up towards Cherry, it is hard for pedestrians to see cars or vice versa.
35	Lots of children and parents walking before/after school and a lot of car traffic.
36	No
37	None that I know of
38	Yes, at the south end where Hallinan Street turns east



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39	At the top, turning onto Cherry. Very bad. The sidewalk needs to continue around to the school driveway.
40	It is difficult to see people at the top part of Hallinan Street on the east side. Also, some drivers seem to come around the bend too quickly. That is a danger to pedestrians on the east side of the road.
41	The curve
42	There is a blind curve at the top of Hallinan St, which is dangerous because pedestrians are forced to walk in the street there.
43	Not for us. When backing out of our driveway, we rarely encounter walkers. And so long as we are not leaving during school drop-off or pick-up time, there is not much traffic on this section of Hallinan Street.
44	Yes, near the south end between Meadows and Upper Cherry
45	Mostly around parked cars... pickup/drop off (unloading)
46	Event parking (soccer games, school events) can be heavy on this stretch and it blocks visibility for and of pedestrians
47	No
48	At the top of the hill where Hallinan St curves into Cherry. Cars can be coming quickly around that curve and it's not always easy to see pedestrians. Maybe a crosswalk further down on Cherry would help if a pathway was added.

What are your typical parking needs? Where do people park and when?	
Comments – Usage?	
1	Streets are wider than most. Plenty of room to park.
2	Most people I encounter seem to live in the wider neighborhood
3	We use street parking every day and overnight for our son's car. We really like the existing parking and would hate to see it decrease in any way.
4	I live above.
5	We have four cars in our house, some are parking on the street
6	On Hallinan St
7	Houses that have multiple cars parked on the street
8	Driveway, street if necessary
9	On Street in front of the house, and in the driveway
10	Most all park in driveways or garages. So, eliminating street parking on one side with a path would work.
11	Parents of school children typically park all along Hallinan and Hemlock when picking up their children from school and for sports events at the school.
12	This would limit our driveway to one car vs two.
13	Usually in my driveway. We need the entire length of our driveway to park all of our cars.
14	Two cars. Parked on our property.
15	Driveway, occasionally one car on the road
16	We park one car on the street on occasion
17	My husband and I park in our driveway and friends park in the street. It's nice and wide. No issues.
18	We do not park on Hallinan St. We park on Hemlock.
19	We park in our driveway and on Hemlock Street.
20	We have lived on Hallinan Circle since 1994. We walked our three kids to/from school without any issues.
21	I typically park at my home on Meadows DR. Parking is tricky during events at Hallinan Elementary, and there is a lot of street parking.
22	There are very rarely parking issues on this stretch of road. Everyone pretty much parks in their driveways, off the street. Occasionally, Hallinan will have an event and people will park at greater distances from the school.
23	When there are events at the school cars are parked all along Hallinan and Hemlock for one to two blocks.
24	Cars park all around that Hallinan Circle rather than in the Hallinan Parking lot. It creates such a mess for the neighborhood. Please designate a no-parking area other than the neighborhood.
25	On-street parking should be restricted at the blind corners where visibility is restricted.
26	Rarely parking in the area mostly walking through it.
27	Cars Park there & garbage bins are on the street
28	People park on hemlock and Hallinan street mostly
29	We don't park there but school events and sports on the field presumably result in
30	We mainly park in the driveway. Guests park on the street.



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31	I sometimes park on Hallinan St to pick up or drop off kids at school. Lots of people park in the circle on Hemlock in spite of the no parking signs. Cars parked on Hemlock near the school at pick-up and drop-off are hazardous because they have to back up to exit the cul de sac while lots of young children are crossing the street and walking across the cul de sac. Any cars turning onto the Hemlock cul de sac off Hallinan St during pick up / drop off are creating a hazardous situation for the children who are walking home.
32	Driveway or street, daily
33	My husband parks in our driveway, and my teenager and I park in the street in front of our house on Hemlock. My in-laws occasionally visit from Medford and bring their trailer with them. We need the full length of our driveway for this. We also are planning to buy our own RV in the next year and have been counting on the full length of our driveway to park a small RV and my husband's car.
34	None for me, but cars parked overnight at the south end between Meadows and Upper Cherry limit visibility and restrict road width. Parking can be an issue near Hemlock during sporting and school events.
35	School drop-off, pickup 2:30 most walking, most traffic
36	Most cars in this section seem to be due to events, not residents
37	I park in my garage
38	We park in our driveway
39	Not needed
40	No parking needs for me. Parkin on Hallinan at S end can create a problem in the evening and early am due to residents parking their cars on the street at night
41	None - as we live on Hemlock/Meadows
42	After school - both sides of Hallinan
43	Off-street parking
44	More parking

What mature vegetation, landscaping, or trees in or near the public right-of-way do you have that we should be aware of? Do you or your neighbors feel strongly about preserving it?	
Comments	
1	Plenty of vegetation. Wouldn't miss a little.
2	I don't have property along Hallinan, but rather close by
3	We have 2 mature fir trees (50 + years old) within 10 feet of the Hallinan Street curb. We also constructed a large waterfall feature and related trees and landscape that would be ruined by any pathway on the West side of Hallinan Street. The 30' x 20' water feature creates a magnet for local wildlife and songbirds. A pathway would destroy this environment.
4	I do not live on that street. However, due to the extreme loss of vegetation in Hallinan due to a back-to-back historic freeze and historic heat wave, science would advise strongly against additional vegetation removal.
5	Preserve all that is possible
6	We have two very large evergreen trees, a waterfall with wildlife in it like frogs and a lot of small Salamanders
7	Japanese maple.630 Hemlock St Daphne
8	This is a mature neighborhood circa 1960. ALL yards/plantings are well-established and could be compromised with a new pathway. Underground watering systems may have to be rerouted at great expense!
9	no tree down or mature vegetation
10	Yes, I have beautiful shrubs, and flowers along the whole curb line that I don't want to be removed!!
11	Yes, and neighbors all want to protect.
12	Yes, I have a strong feeling about preserving the existing landscape of the area. Trees should be a priority.
13	Yes, we have mature trees, and we want to strongly preserve them.
14	We have many mature fir trees and plants, boulders, and a water feature. I feel very strongly about preserving our trees. If you drive up or down Hallinan Street, it is only green because there is beautiful vegetation all the way to the curb. You don't see as much of that on lower (North of Hemlock) Hallinan Street. Cutting these trees would ruin the character of the street.
15	Tall, old evergreen. Yes, must preserve.
16	Large fir tree within a few feet of the road, designed landscaping along the road
17	We have a very large fir tree within a few feet of the road
18	YES - I have beautiful evergreen trees and other landscaping along my property near the curb.



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19	There are two large trees on both sides of Hemlock Street in the cul de sac. These block the sidewalk path and force most people to walk in the street to not step over tree roots or get hit by bushes or branches. The pathway to school needs to be addressed in this project to make the route safe for walkers/bikers/etc.
20	This is a well-kept neighborhood. I feel strongly that we should preserve all of it.
21	As I'm remembering, there is a beautiful magnolia, a beautiful dogwood tree, and 2-3 cherry trees on the east. I'm not remembering any on the west but no guarantees there aren't any. on the east side of the street. I only picked east because of the visibility situation at the top of the hill, but y'all are more knowledgeable than I am about that issue.
22	There are some very beautiful ornamental cherry trees right on the corner where the road bends, just before Cherry (at the curve, on your left if you're going up the hill).
23	Don't know
24	Trees, shrubs, and tall grasses should be removed where they create visibility obstructions.
25	Definitely, I like having shade over any sidewalks. Many trees were removed from the street between hemlock and laurel, and it is now hot and less pleasant
26	Much of our landscaping has been removed due to water penetration and sewer line work. We have a swale and a sump pump to move the water from around the house. We would not want any of the remediation work that we undertook since moving here a few years ago to be destroyed or made unusable.
27	We did a major landscaping remodel 16 years ago, so the plants and trees along our property line abutting Hallinan are mature, lush, and well-established. We have an irrigation system in this area as well. We are particularly concerned about the cherry tree we planted within the last 5 to 10 years in this area. It is a gorgeous tree and finally at the perfect size.
28	Wonderberry (purple) is popular with w/birds
29	I don't live on this stretch
30	The property owned by the school near the entrance to the school is overgrown and dangerous.
31	No
332	We are fine removing anything for the path.
33	Please remove all sick and struggling trees.
34	None

Q8 Have you noticed any flooding, ponding, or stormwater issues adjacent to your property, in the right-of-way?

1	No
2	Don't know along the proposed route, but definitely around Freepons Park
3	No flood, ponding, or stormwater issues were observed.
4	I do not live on the street. I live ABOVE the street, and we are seeing extreme runoff in my neighborhood.
5	Why do anything at all? Don't see any purpose in changing the configuration of the neighborhood
6	When it's raining, it's always running rivers of water because we are on a steep hill
7	Water can accumulate just south of my driveway near the street if a lot of rain
8	If storm drains are kept clear, they are usually sufficient
9	No
10	It is a hill, should not be any flooding unless you go all the way to the bottom of Hallinan St by Laurel
11	No
12	No
13	Yes
14	No
15	Yes. Sewer on meadows near Hallinan spills into the driveway and many homes have basements flooded by streams under the street.
16	Yes
17	No
18	Everyone has flooding in basements but that's because of the springs in the hill.
19	No
20	A large volume of runoff
21	Lots of downhill runoff
22	No



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23	No
24	The land is primarily clay in this area, and it can take a while for rainwater to drain. Often our driveway will flood, and we will need to park on street.
25	No
26	There is a storm drain on Meadow’s right before the intersection with Hallinan St that gets overwhelmed by runoff during heavy rains. That water rushed across Meadows and down Hallinan Street, on the east side of Hallinan.
27	No
28	A block from Freepons Park this winter there was a flooding issue a block into Hemlock that the city came and took care of.
29	No
30	Yes! Terrible. But I’m on the east end of the school field, not Hallinan St
31	No
32	Yes
33	No
34	Not on the street, only in my backyard.

38	No, on a slope so there is runoff.
39	I don't live on this stretch, but when there is a big storm there is often water flowing out of sump pumps onto the street gutters in this area.

1	Yes, at 1630 Hallinan we have a private irrigation system for the lawn and water feature that reaches the Hallinan Street curb.

4	Yes, irrigation and sprinklers 630 Hemlock St
5	Over 50% of houses have underground systems
6	Some people have sprinklers, ponds etc.

10	We have sprinklers in our yard as do many neighbors.

17	Yes, the pipe from the swale in our front yard to the street.

19	Yes, we have an irrigation system in this area (sprinklers) and just had corrective work done on our sprinkler system on Tuesday, May 3.
20	public water meters are the closest plumbing to the roadway.
21	Gutters and downspouts drain to the street via an underground pipe on the right side of my property

Is there anything else you would like us to know about Hallinan Street or how the approximate 50' public right-of-way along this portion is used?	
Comments – Usage?	
1	A sidewalk on the north side of Cherry Lane and south Hallinan Street is badly needed.
2	The residents along Hallinan can provide insights. Their perspectives are critical.
3	The more sidewalks the better
4	We have a beautiful street, there is no improvement needed. We have very large, old trees right by the road along the whole street. It would be terrible to see them go! Our street is quite steep and if the sidewalk is in place it would be very dangerous to back cars out of driveways. I would hate to see someone, especially a child on the bike get hurt. Please find the other streets that need improvement, it is not our street. We have been owners here for over 30 years and never had a problem. Thank you for listening all the inputs, really appreciate it!
5	I believe the improved Street is about 32 ft wide. This leaves about 9' on either side of Hallinan. There are mature fir trees on both sides of Hallinan St in these 9 feet of right of way. It is beautiful the way it is. A new pathway creates other hazards not currently present. The slope would mean the pathway would be steep and allow bikes and skateboards to gain speed and not be visible creating a hazard to people on the path and a hazard for homeowners backing out. For vehicles, Hallinan cannot be made narrower. It is a feeder street. People do use their parking in front of their homes. In our view, the City made a wise decision to not do a pathway on Hallinan as they saw from neighbors' input that it wasn't wanted or needed. The present wide street is enjoyable and safe for walking as it is. We enjoy walking it each day.
6	I DO NOT support this project! School events and after-school pick-up require space for parents. If there is parking on one side of the street and a pathway on the other, there will be little room for buses and neighborhood cars. This PATHWAY is not needed in this neighborhood!
7	I lived on his street for years when my kids went to Hallinan. There is a definite need for a school pathway.
8	We do not want to lose our property--the lots are not huge, so homes are close to the street
9	No - just against this project and what it will do to property value, parking, landscaping
10	I'd caution bike riders to give pedestrians the right of way on any path.
11	I do not see the need to spend so much money and disruption on a problem that does not exist. Maybe a better use of resources would be to redirect the car traffic somewhere else and let the pedestrians keep their street the way it is. The top-of-the-hill situation definitely could use help.
12	This is such a terrible use of money during a pandemic. We have recently had thefts in the neighborhood, and this will give criminals closer access to each home on Hallinan.
13	I strongly oppose adding a sidewalk to Hallinan Street. We need our entire driveway to park our cars. We live on Hallinan Street on the West side. If you put a sidewalk on Hallinan Street, you are going to have at least 5 or 10 more cars on the street parking likely which is not advantageous to anyone. I have lived on this street my entire life and grew up walking to the elementary school from down the hill. A sidewalk has never been needed. I see kids now safely walking on the street. As do Dog walkers. It's a very safe street, the only improvement to make would be to add a stop sign by the top of Cherry and Glenmorrie and Upper Cherry.

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20	Yes, the traffic for school pick-up and drop-off in the cul de sac is a concern. First, there needs to be a crosswalk on all points of the four-way stop on Hallinan and Hemlock for pedestrian safety. People often speed and roll through the stop signs. The school encourages parents to drop off in front of the school, yet many use the Hemlock cul de sac as a drop-off. I've seen many close calls because students are walking in the street weaving between cars. I've talked to the principal many times over the years about these safety concerns. This year she has an aide stand at the school entrance with a walkie-talkie for 10 min. after school. She doesn't talk to the parents that are parked or enforce traffic concerns. Community Officers sometimes patrol the area and ask parked cars to leave, but still, allow pick up and drop off. Cars often park there too even though it is posted as a no parking zone. Cars continue to come in and then can't turn around. This usually is a greater problem when it rains and in the winter months. Without addressing these concerns then the proposed path will not be a safe way for students to get to school. Also, unless the path connects at the top of Hallinan/Cherry and continues around the top to school then it seems pointless too. I took some data on 5/13 during morning and afternoon drop-off tracking cars/bikes/walkers. I'll send it to your email.
21	Please don't spend our taxes on this project.
22	I would HIGHLY recommend the pathway continue to the entrance to Hallinan Elementary because if it ends at the intersection of Hallinan and Cherry, encouraging higher use in the process, there will be even more people in danger around that corner. Take it all the way to the Hallinan Elementary driveway and you'll drastically reduce pedestrian and cyclist risk.
23	Lots of pedestrians walking, often with children and dogs, as well as elementary school children use the space. It would greatly improve safety for everyone if there was a walking path. I feel strongly that the safest location for the path is the east side of the street so that elementary school children don't need to cross the intersection to get to school.
24	I strongly advise the city to review the 2013 Landslide study!
25	The street that could really use a sidewalk is Hemlock between the school and Freepons Park. That sees the most traffic in this neighborhood.
