Title of Document: 8.3 LOPR_Law Enforcement Officer Training

Background:

The Lake Oswego Police Department (LOPD) is a full-service police force whose mission is to cultivate an exceptional quality of life for everyone in our community.

Park Rules section VIII. Enforcement of Rules, provides the authority for the LOPD, Park Rangers and Park Employees to enforce Park Rules. Per Ordinance 34.12.600:

34.12.600 Park Offenses.

Unless otherwise indicated, the park rules and offenses apply to all park and recreation property within the City of Lake Oswego and along the Willamette River regardless of the extent to which such park has been altered or improved. A violation of park rules as now or hereafter constituted is declared a civil violation and may be enforced in accordance with the City's civil violation procedure.

The Police Department carries out its mission through divisions with activities that range from criminal investigations and traffic law enforcement to animal control and education programs.

The Department also fields two K-9 teams, provides two school resource officers, and operates a 911 emergency dispatch center.

The Police Department's Communications Division (LOCOM) provides 24-hour-a-day emergency and non-emergency call answering and dispatching of services for police, fire, and medical emergencies in Lake Oswego, West Linn, and Milwaukie.



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LOPD Training Division:

The training of police officers remains one of the most vital functions of the Lake Oswego Police Department. Over the years, the training function of the department has grown into an effective and efficient method of producing professional and competent officers.

The training program, coordinated by Officer Mike Brady, encourages officers and supervisors to follow their particular interests and expand their knowledge as they instruct their peers.

The average LOPD officer obtains approximately 120 hours of training each year within various areas of instruction including firearms, defensive tactics, cultural diversity, dealing with the mentally ill, emergency vehicle operation and myriad other subjects. The focus on training has helped officers to be some of the best trained police officers in the state.

Officers also read daily training bulletins each shift about many of the low-frequency, high-risk situations faced in law enforcement. These topics include vehicle pursuit management, terrorism, search and seizure issues, as well as personnel matters. After reading about each topic, the officer answers a test question about the topic. This daily training helps the officer to stay familiar with policies and procedures, and helps them to prepare to handle whatever situations confront them.

The internal Police website (private pages) makes available resource guides and training materials accessible as needed.
