



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Address: 768 North Shore Road

Historic Name: Parelius, Kenneth, House

This Arts and Crafts style house was built in 1939 for Kenneth and Viola Parelius. Parelius operated the Ford dealership in Lake Oswego before World War II. Besides his activities with various car dealerships around Portland, Parelius was involved in restaurants, real estate and life insurance. They sold the property in 1949 to Arthur and Helen Boesch.

The Parelius residence, on a small promontory jutting into Lakewood Bay, was built almost ten years after Lakewood was platted by George F. Cottrell, a noted town-planning engineer. Marshall Brothers engineered each site in this district, west of State Street and bordering the Lake.

Elaborate advertisements and brochures were created by the Ladd Estate Company to sell off lots in the late twenties and early thirties. One such brochure described Lakewood as "Portland's only lake district. There are outdoor sports to be enjoyed in every season; fishing and boating most of the year; swimming during the summer; very good skating almost every winter Unusually attractive paths attract you to roam over Lakewood. Right now you will find wild flowers galore to lead you on and on through wooded and mossy glens, up over rocky upthrusts and tumbles of mossgrown boulders."

Previously thought to have been designed by prominent Oregon architect Wade Pipes, it is now believed that the house was designed by local architect Richard Sundeleaf. Sundeleaf was employed for a period of time as a draftsman for Pipes, who had traveled to England early in his professional career, and was inspired by the romantic beauty of English vernacular buildings. Often combining stucco with wood siding to cover his asymmetrical compositions, Sundeleaf and Pipes sought to achieve the rustic, romantic quality of medieval architecture. It is well preserved and well integrated into the prominent site at the juncture of Lakewood Bay and the main lake.
