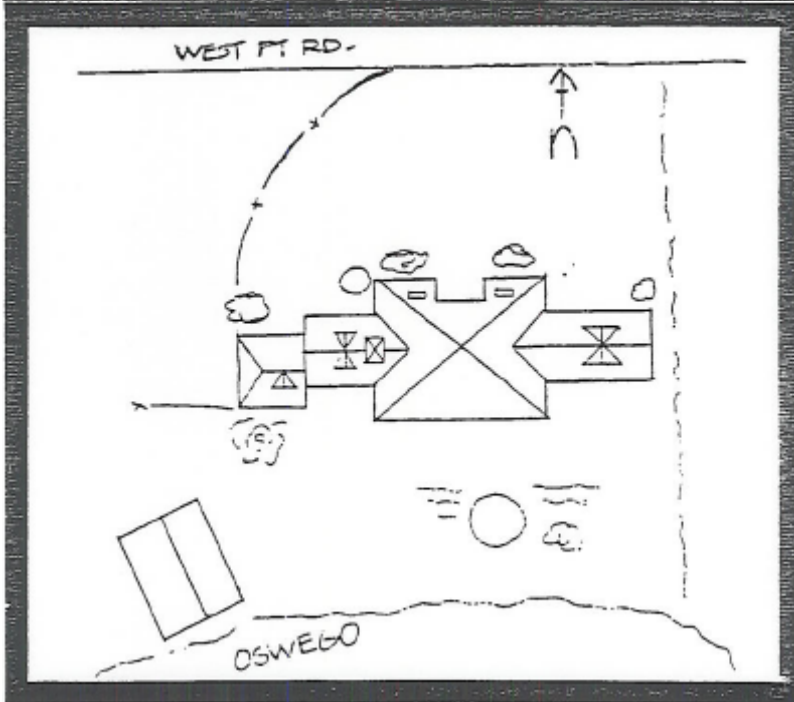

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Address: 930 West Point Road

Historic Name: Harris, Paul, House

The subject dwelling is significant for its association with Paul Harris as well as an excellent example of the French Colonial Revival style. The original owners, Paul and Susan Harris, purchased the property from the Ladd Estate Company in 1934. Paul Harris, a prominent trial lawyer and judge, sat on the Board of Governors of the State Bar.

In 1937 the Harris' sold to Sevilla M. Brittan. Mrs. Brittan sold the house in 1944 to Stanley G. and Gladys Terry, who owned the property into the 1970's.

The house is one of several designed by local architect Richard Sundeleaf. It was built in 1934 and shares elements common to many of Sundeleaf's designs from this period. It is asymmetrical in plan, clad with brick, and illuminated by multi-light windows. The house differs from others from this period in its overall form and detailing. Unlike Sundeleaf' other designs from this period, the subject house has tall hip roofs are commonly associated with the French Colonial Revival style. The close eaves, segmentally arched windows, and dormers contribute to the historic quality of the dwelling. Most of Sundeleaf's composition display an English rather than French inspiration.

The house is also important for its contribution to the historic character of the Lakewood neighborhood.
